As you will hopefully have seen, Jamie's recent letter to everyone has since called for volunteers to a 'Way Forward' group.

We thanked the many individuals who helped to make the Convocation a success. But we have every Tertiary to thank for their work and wisdom over the last 18 months. The prophetic purpose which we have discovered together will surely inspire us for years to come. By timely coincidence, we also heard back from a group reviewing our working practices, which will help Chapter play its part.

As ever, there was plenty of other business. With the help of Jan Le Billon, Provincial Safeguarding Officer, we continued work towards a safeguarding policy to help Areas care for vulnerable members. There is currently a significant number of cases involving abuse or allegations of abuse being handled by our Safeguarding team. Katherine Ames-Lewis, our hard-working Minutes Secretary, has handed on her role to Angela Alexander. However there remain several crucial vacancies:

- Editor of *Little Portion* to succeed Verena Tschudin (perhaps on a job-share basis), and also new members of the editorial team which helps her
- Editor of this publication, *Third Order News*, to follow Sue Charles
- Membership Secretary, who will inherit a top-notch database from Mollie Kingham.

Our thanks to all these people for their generous service. Could you take any of the vacant roles on? They enjoy the support of a friendly Communications team, so you will not be alone! Contact Chris Jenkins (comms@tssf.org.uk) if you would like to know more.

Two new publications will soon be launched, thanks to the efforts of their editors and contributors: reflections on the TSSF Principles will be sent to novices, and copies of an Assisi Booklet on ageing in the Third Order will go to Area Teams.

An updated Area Team Handbook is also to be launched on the website, offering more advice for the diverse questions which crop up locally. For instance, it suggests how to enable ex-pat Tertiaries to keep in touch and renew their pledge. It also seeks to help Area teams balance the call to meet regularly (which goes back to Francis' own vision for the Third Order) with the pressures that many members face. The new handbook makes clear that when times get tough and prevent attendance, we need only explain our absence. That's not just about accountability; it ensures that the support of fellow Tertiaries is there for you.

Our agenda always begins with the election of novices to profession. At this point there is usually a bit of confusion, either because names have come in after deadline, or details supplied for the membership database are incomplete, or the novitiate has not actually finished. Novice formation lasts between two and four years, and it would be unfair to rush it. We'd be grateful if Area Teams could ensure that at least two years have been completed, and membership details are up-to-date, before a candidate's name goes forward.

We ended by praying thanksgivings and farewells with Averil, and blessings on Jamie. They have both found Jamie's five-month 'apprenticeship' invaluable. This period of overlap will hopefully become standard practice throughout TSSF, and it now comes heartily recommended!

'GOD, EACH OTHER AND THE WORLD'
LEE ABBEY 4TH-7TH JULY

Eight tertiaries (Anne Spalding, Debby and Jeremy Plummer, Fran Wakefield, Jo Hamblin, Tim Higgins, Jamie Hacker Hughes and Bishop David Walker) spent three days at Lee Abbey, Devon, for this conference organised by ARC, the Association of Religious Communities. Around 100 of us were there in total, including 6 CSF sisters, Beverley, Chris, Gina, Joyce, Maureen and Sue and a SSF brother, Brother Martin John from Glasshampton.

The conference aimed to facilitate conversations between the many different types of religious community, traditional, modern, and emerging, and all of these were represented including sisters from the Community of All Hallows, Ditchingham, the Community of Saint Mary the Virgin at Wantage, the Community of the Holy Name in Derby, Benedictine sisters from Malling Abbey, The Sisters of Jesus Way from West Kirby, Liverpool, the Sisters of the Church from Gerard's Cross, (formerly Ham Common), Benedictine monks, Mirfield Fathers from the Community of the Resurrection, and others. Recent years have seen a significant fall in those entering traditional religious life with the number of Anglican religious being around 380, as compared to the 900 or so in religious life in 1998. Numbers of vocations to traditional communities are dropping too and the number if those living in traditional communities is decreasing .

On the other hand, the numbers of those in new monastic and emerging communities are growing apace. Modern and emerging communities represented at the conference included the Northumbria Community, the Community of Saint Aidan and Saint Chad, CMS, Chemin Neuf, the Community of Hopeweavers from Southampton, the Community of Saint Anselm from Lambeth, and some new emerging communities including Moot, the community of Saint Margaret the Queen in Streatham and the Wellspring community in Peckham, South London. All in all, over 40 communities, traditional, modern, traditional, and emerging. It was a truly wonderful gathering.

And it was a truly beautiful place to gather too. Lee Abbey is situated in beautiful surroundings on the North Devon coast and the community there were amazingly hospitable to us all. The sun shone ceaselessly throughout the three days that we were all there enabling us to walk down to the seaside and shore, through the woods and up to the three crosses on the hill and we were accompanied throughout by the gentle lowing of beautiful Devon cattle. All thoroughly Franciscan.

In our sessions, both plenary and in small groups, we had talks, discussion and conversation on how all of our very different but all Anglican communities relate to God, to each other and to the world and we also learned more about ARC and the Advisory Council on Religious Communities. It was a pretty packed programme and one had to be creative to fit in the other things.

The worship was memorable with morning and evening prayer and compline being led according to the traditions of some of the various communities represented. Thus we had Franciscan night prayer, but also morning prayer following the Benedictine pattern and that of the Northumbria Community. The main Eucharist was celebrated by the Bishop of Exeter and there was a video contribution from the Archbishop of Canterbury.

A few days of fellowship with many kindred spirits from many traditions. Shared worship, shared meals, shared time and memories together, shared laughter and, yes, many shared conversations.

POSSIBLE TERTIARY HELP AT CSF'S HOUSE IN METHERINGHAM

Our recent CSF Chapter has authorised Sr Liz to move from Metherringham to explore a new opportunity for community and ministry which is clearly opening up in a small town in Leicestershire. It seems very evident that this vision and call are of God, and so we are responding. However Liz's going will leave our Metherringham house in need of extra help and support, as there will be only Maureen, and Judith Ann who has significant health issues which limit her participation in the life and work of the house. We are looking to see how some support might be offered from time to time by sisters from other houses.

However we would also very much welcome contact from tertiaries who might be interested to come to stay for a time at Metherringham as helpers/working guests, to share in the life of prayer, to help make community and to participate in the work of the house. The practical tasks would be mainly housework, cooking, hospitality to resident guests (only one at a time), day visitors and day groups, and perhaps some gardening. We believe this could be a mutually beneficial experience, enabling the tertiary to share in a resident Franciscan community during their stay. Metherringham is a large village in Lincolnshire, between Lincoln and Sleaford, and is served by buses and a railway station. It has a range of shops and other necessary facilities.
